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should not be shown to campaign teams or other people without written consent.

These criteria are not the only criteria that will affect chances of becoming leader.

They are crucially important and it takes time to build capability in each area.

Electability: Being able to be popular through the TV cameras so voters who

have not met the leader will vote for them.

Funds: A large war chest with good cashflow on an ongoing basis to fund

campaigns, especially professional staff.

Half of Caucus Voting for You: Building relationships over time, as well as

bringing new people into the party who will be loyal voters.

Solidarity: Being there for caucus members, staffers and party people when

they are under attack, under pressure or have difficult personal situations to deal

with.

Public Speaking: Being able to dominate with confident speaking to general

audiences, dominate or attract attention in the house, and being able to handle

interjections either with humour or a withering put down.

Ethics: Prepare for likely attacks on ethics by being completely clean on all

issues, including use of parliamentary services funds, fundraising and donations, and

accusations of extramarital affairs.

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
